These trekkers stumble upon something extraordinary at Dhakoba fort

At 6.30am on Sunday, six of us boarded a bus to Murbad from Kalyan with plan to trek Durg-Murbad. From Murbad, we had to reach Palu, a small settlement ahead of Dhasai and from there to Amboli ghat to the foot of Dhakoba peak. After treading the barely-motorable road in a jeep, we finally got there at about 9am.


Amboli ghat is densely forested and the cattle trails can be misleading. So we took the longer route and after an exhausting two-and-a-half-hour climb, we reached a tiny temple at the top. There we saw a rocky patch good enough for a trail and followed a gully that led us to a plateau. On the right, we could see the Dhakoba peak. It was 1pm by then. We came across two people trekking to Amboli. We discussed routes with them, though I figured neither of us really knew what we were talking about.

We climbed towards Dhakoba peak. Once we got there, we were

confronted by a magnificent view of the twin pinnacles of Gorakhgad and Macchindragad. The view was breathtaking. After impromptu gasping and proclaiming, we started on our way down from the other side. We decided to have lunch at Dhakoba temple, which lies on the ridge connecting Durg and Dhakoba.

Dinner seemed to affect our sense of direction and we found ourselves staring down a steep drop. Grudgingly, we retraced our steps back to the temple and managed to find the trail to the base of Durg fort and further to the Durga devi temple. We dropped our sacks for the day and animatedly talked about the steep descent into the Konkan through the Kuthedhar ghat the next day. While a few of us went to check the route with the locals, the rest pitched the tent, unpacked some more food and built a fire.

We awoke at 6.30 am and walked through the chilly mist to reach the top. The windswept peak glimmered with the first

beams of the morning sun. After a quick breakfast of bread and jam, we headed down Kuthedhar ghat. The 3,000-feet descent into the Konkan was steep, and mildly put, unnerving. However, there were handholds all the way

down. We reached the base at Kuthedhar village after three frightening, but exciting hours. We walked for another 30 minutes to Rampur and took a jeep back to Dhasai, tired and exhilarated.
